**COMPLAINT**

COME NOW Plaintiffs Judy Walker, Linda Lear, Kevin Lear, and Sharon King, by and through their undersigned counsel, and for their Complaint against the Defendant, Ramsey Enterprises LLC, a Kentucky For-Profit Corporation, state as follows:

**I. PARTIES**

1. Plaintiff JUDY WALKER resides and is domiciled in Lexington, Fayette County, Kentucky. Therefore, Plaintiff is a citizen of the State of Kentucky.

2. Plaintiffs LINDA LEAR and KEVIN LEAR reside and are domiciled in Nicholasville, Jessamine County, Kentucky. Therefore, Plaintiffs are citizens of the State of Kentucky.

3. Plaintiff SHARON KING resides and is domiciled in Lexington, Fayette County, Kentucky. Therefore, Plaintiff is a citizen of the State of Kentucky.

1 4. At all relevant times, Defendant RAMSEY ENTERPRISES LLC (“Defendant” or  
 2 “Ramsey’s) owned and operated various Ramsey’s Diner locations, including 3090 Helmsdale Pl,  
 3 Ste 270, Lexington, KY 40509; 112 Lucille Dr, Lexington, KY 40511; 4391 Old Harrodsburg Rd,  
 4 Lexington, KY 40513; and 151 W Zandale Dr, Lexington, KY 40503, which manufactured and  
 5 sold the *Salmonella*-contaminated desserts that are the subject of this action.

6 5. At all times relevant hereto, Defendant, MISSY’S PIE SHOP (hereinafter “Missy’s Pies”),  
 7 was a Kentucky company owned and/or operated by Defendant Ramsey Enterprises LLC and can  
 8 be served through Robert B. Ramsey, 151 West Zandale Drive, Suite 100B, Lexington, Kentucky  
 9 40503. Missy’s Pies delivered pies and desserts to Ramsey’s at its various locations, which  
 10 Ramsey’s sold for consumption to patrons

11 **II. FACTS**

12 **The *Salmonella* Bacteria**

13 6. *Salmonella* is an enteric bacterium, which means that it lives in the intestinal tracts  
 14 of humans and other animals. *Salmonella* bacteria are usually transmitted to humans by eating  
 15 foods contaminated with human or animal feces. Contaminated foods usually look and smell  
 16 normal. Contaminated foods are often of animal origin, but all foods, including vegetables, may  
 17 become contaminated. An infected food handler who neglects to wash his or her hands with soap  
 18 and warm water after using the bathroom may also contaminate food.

19 7. Once in the lumen of the small intestine, the bacteria penetrate the epithelium, multiply,  
 20 and enter the blood within 6-72 hours. As few as 15-20 cells of *Salmonella* bacteria can cause  
 21 salmonellosis or a more serious typhoid-like fever. Variables, such as the health and age of the  
 22 host and virulence differences among the serotypes, affect the nature and extent of the illness.

1 Infants, elderly, hospitalized, and immune suppressed persons are the populations that are most  
2 susceptible to disease and suffer the most severe symptoms.

3 8. The acute symptoms of *Salmonella* gastroenteritis include the sudden onset of nausea,  
4 abdominal cramping, and diarrhea lasting several days. The diarrhea often turns bloody. There is  
5 no real cure for *Salmonella* infection, except treatment of the symptoms. Persons with severe  
6 diarrhea may require rehydration, often with intravenous fluids.

7 9. Persons with diarrhea usually recover completely, although it may be several months  
8 before bowel habits return entirely to normal. A small number of persons who are infected with  
9 *Salmonella* will go on to develop pains in their joints, irritation of the eyes, and painful urination.  
10 This development is called reactive arthritis, and it can last for months or years, sometimes leading  
11 to chronic arthritis that is difficult to treat. Antibiotic treatment does not make a difference in  
12 whether the person later develops arthritis.

13 **The 2025 Ramsey’s Pies *Salmonella* Outbreak**

14 10. On June 27, 2025, the Lexington-Fayette County Health Department (LFCHD) initiated an  
15 investigation into an outbreak of *Salmonella*. Initially reported cases were interviewed to see what  
16 food items they consumed prior to their illness. It was discovered that each case had eaten at least  
17 one meal at different Ramsey’s Diner locations—Helmsdale Place, Lucille Dr., Old Harrodsburg  
18 Rd., and Zandale Dr. (formerly East High St.)—between June 17 and 20, 2025. While the entrée  
19 items differed, each case consumed a custard-based pie, topped with meringue, or a cheesecake  
20 dessert. Patrons were advised to discard the remainder of any pie purchased from Missy’s or  
21 Ramsey’s Diner in July 2025.

22 11. A confirmed case was defined as a culture-positive case of *Salmonella* (serotype  
23 Enteritidis, if typed) that either reported exposure to a Ramsey's Diner location or a dessert item  
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1 from Missy's Pies prior to symptom onset, OR a case of *Salmonella* Enteritidis with an isolate  
2 related to the outbreak strain, within 0-2 alleles by cgMLST, with onset or specimen collection  
3 date ranging from May 23, 2025 to July 13, 2025.

4 12. A probable case was defined as a CIDT-positive case of *Salmonella* that either reported  
5 exposure to a Ramsey's Diner location or a dessert item from Missy's Pies prior to symptom onset,  
6 OR a clinically-compatible case (symptomatic with diarrhea, abdominal pain, nausea, vomiting,  
7 etc.) with an epi-link (exposure to a Ramsey's Diner location or a dessert item from Missy's Pies  
8 prior to symptom onset) to identified outbreak-associated cases, with onset date ranging from May  
9 23, 2025 to July 13, 2025.

10 13. The final count included 68 total cases (28 confirmed, 40 probable). Most cases (63) were  
11 from Kentucky, although three were from Ohio, one from Massachusetts, and one from Florida.  
12 For cases with information, 46 (68%) were female. Onset dates ranged from June 7, 2025 to July  
13 1, 2025. Ten cases reported hospitalization and no cases reported death. Thirty cases provided a  
14 specimen for testing, of which two were PCR positive for *Salmonella* and 28 were positive for  
15 specifically *Salmonella* Enteritidis. The outbreak strain was identified as *Salmonella* Enteritidis.  
16 This investigation has been assigned to outbreak number KY25-345 and the multistate code  
17 2507KYJEG-1.

18 14. LFCHD worked with Ramsey's and Missy's Pies to discard any pies that were still onsite.  
19 Samples of pies and eggs were collected for testing to be completed by the state public health  
20 laboratory. The investigation determined that the desserts were produced at a single bakery with  
21 unpasteurized eggs from a single farm location. The wholesale distributor had recently started  
22 supplying eggs from a local farm in May 2025. The investigation also included a state  
23 manufacturing follow-up at Clem's Refrigerated Foods, and a state and FDA follow-up (inspection  
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1 and environmental sampling) at MapleCrest Farms. DLS performed testing on eggs and pies held  
2 from Missy's Pies 7/1/25, but all samples resulted in "No Salmonella Isolated".

3 15. It was noted that the meringue on desserts was not brought to proper cooking temperature  
4 (July 1 temperature check was at 150F) without a consumer advisory. Desserts were cooled at  
5 room temperature, then transported on a non-refrigerated truck, and finally held at room  
6 temperature at the restaurants for several hours prior to refrigeration.

7 16. A thorough cleaning of the common kitchen where pies were prepared was completed and  
8 the establishment was allowed to return to operations to prepare lower risk items such as shelf  
9 stable fruit pies and other pies which do not have eggs as ingredients for fillings.

10 17. The source of the outbreak was confirmed to be egg-related desserts by Missy's Pies at  
11 Ramsey's Diner. The outbreak was declared over on July 13, 2025.

### 12 **Judy Walker's *Salmonella* Infection**

13 18. Judy Walker is a 76-year-old woman who lives in Lexington, Kentucky, with her 75-year-  
14 old husband Randy. Judy was sickened by the potentially deadly *Salmonella enterica* after  
15 consuming cheesecake purchased from the Ramsey's Diner located at 3090 Helmsdale Place, Suite  
16 270, Lexington, KY 40509, on June 18, 2025.

17 19. On June 22, 2025, Judy began experiencing the onset of significant gastrointestinal and  
18 systemic symptoms, including nausea, diarrhea, stomach cramping, fevers up to 102°F, muscle  
19 aches, fatigue, headaches, and urinary tract symptoms.

20 20. Two days later, on June 24, 2025, Judy presented for an office visit with complaints of  
21 diarrhea and chills. She reported a two- to three-day history of persistent diarrhea accompanied by  
22 loss of appetite, fatigue, and chills, as well as ongoing nausea without vomiting. After evaluating  
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1 her condition, Dr. Corales reassured Judy that her symptoms would likely improve in the coming  
2 days and advised conservative at-home management.

3 21. By the following day, however, Judy’s condition had not improved. She felt extremely  
4 weak, continued to experience diarrhea, and had not eaten for four days. As her symptoms  
5 worsened, she sought care at the emergency room, where medical staff conducted multiple tests  
6 and imaging studies.

7 22. She was found to be severely dehydrated and was treated with intravenous fluids. Upon  
8 discharge, Judy was provided with a stool specimen kit, which her husband returned to the hospital  
9 the next morning.

10 23. On June 26, 2025, as her condition continued to deteriorate, Judy presented to the  
11 emergency department at Baptist Health Lexington, where she was evaluated by a physician  
12 assistant. At that time, she reported a four-day history of persistent diarrhea, abdominal pain, and  
13 nausea, despite prior treatment. She described initially experiencing as many as ten episodes of  
14 diarrhea per day, along with worsening weakness and inability to tolerate food.

15 24. While in the emergency department, diagnostic testing revealed mild electrolyte  
16 abnormalities, including low potassium, and slightly elevated liver enzymes. Imaging studies,  
17 including a CT scan of the abdomen and pelvis, demonstrated inflammation of the small bowel  
18 consistent with enterocolitis.

19 25. Despite the severity of her symptoms, Judy’s condition was managed with intravenous  
20 fluids for dehydration and medications for nausea and abdominal cramping. She was discharged  
21 in stable condition with instructions to continue hydration and adhere to a bland diet, while her  
22 stool studies remained pending.

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1 26. On June 27, 2025, Judy was notified that her stool GI PCR Panel tested positive for  
2 *Salmonella*. The hospital promptly reported the result to the Kentucky Health Department (KY  
3 DPH) and submitted her specimen for confirmatory testing, although *Salmonella* could not  
4 ultimately be isolated by the public health laboratory.

5 27. Judy was subsequently identified as a probable case in the outbreak designated KY25-345  
6 and 2507KYJEG-1 by the KY DPH. She is included in the KY DPH outbreak linelist as a probable  
7 case (PulseNet ID: KY\_\_\_2025-018779-223602759, NEDSS ID: 26831065). This outbreak was  
8 associated with desserts from Ramsey's Diner/Missy's Pies in Lexington, Kentucky.

9 28. In the days and weeks that followed, Judy continued to suffer from significant weakness,  
10 intermittent diarrhea, and an inability to resume normal eating and daily activities. Her recovery  
11 was prolonged and debilitating, requiring ongoing medical management, including antibiotics and  
12 follow-up care. Even as her acute symptoms gradually improved, she remained physically  
13 weakened and unable to carry out routine tasks for an extended period.

#### 14 **Linda and Kevin Lear's *Salmonella* and *E. coli* Infections**

15 29. Kevin and Linda Lear are a happily married couple living in Nicholasville, Kentucky. The  
16 couple were sickened by the potentially deadly *Salmonella enterica* after consuming dinner  
17 followed by dessert pies (chocolate pie with meringue) purchased from the Ramsey's Diner located  
18 at 4391 Old Harrodsburg Road, Lexington, KY 40513, on June 19, 2025.

19 30. On June 20, 2025, both Linda and Kevin developed acute gastrointestinal symptoms  
20 including nausea, diarrhea, and abdominal cramping, as well as fevers, muscle aches, fatigue, and  
21 headaches.

22 31. Their condition rapidly deteriorated over the following 48 hours, rendering them unable to  
23 care for themselves without assistance. Despite initial attempts to manage symptoms at home with  
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1 hydration and rest, the severity and persistence of their symptoms necessitated emergency medical  
2 care.

3 32. On June 24, 2025, Linda was evaluated at St. Joseph Jessamine Emergency Department  
4 and diagnosed with food poisoning, dehydration, electrolyte abnormalities, rhabdomyolysis, and  
5 acute kidney injury. She received intravenous fluids and electrolyte replacement but was  
6 discharged with outpatient follow-up.

7 33. Kevin was assessed concurrently and found to have similar diagnoses, including  
8 dehydration, electrolyte abnormalities, rhabdomyolysis, acute kidney injury, and elevated blood  
9 glucose. He was treated with IV fluids and electrolytes and discharged with prescriptions.

10 34. Linda's recovery was prolonged, marked by persistent gastrointestinal symptoms lasting  
11 several weeks. Both Linda and Kevin experienced significant disruptions to their quality of life,  
12 including dietary restrictions, curtailed social activities, altered travel plans, and anxiety about  
13 food safety.

14 35. Kevin's recovery was further complicated by preexisting conditions, including a recent calf  
15 injury requiring crutches. The illness aggravated his essential tremors, caused cognitive  
16 difficulties, and prolonged physical debilitation. Both endured severe physical distress, lifestyle  
17 changes, and ongoing gastrointestinal symptoms. Kevin also experienced distressing nighttime  
18 incontinence that damaged personal property.

19 36. Stool samples collected on July 8, 2025, at Solaris Diagnostics in Nicholasville confirmed  
20 *Salmonella* infection in Linda, while Kevin tested negative for *Salmonella* but positive for *E. coli*  
21 O157.

22 37. Both Linda and Kevin were ultimately identified as epidemiologically linked cases in the  
23 Kentucky Department for Public Health (KY DPH) outbreak investigations KY25-345 and  
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1 2507KYJEG-1. They are included in the KY DPH outbreak linelist as epi-linked cases (Kevin  
2 NEDSS ID: 63957922, Linda NEDSS ID: 11066342). This outbreak was associated with desserts  
3 from Ramsey's Diner/Missy's Pies in Lexington, Kentucky.

4 **Sharon King's *Salmonella* Infection**

5 38. Sharon King is a 72-year-old woman who lives in Lexington, Kentucky, with her 49-year-  
6 old daughter Angela Hancock and her 15-year-old grandson Quincy Hancock. Sharon contracted  
7 a severe *Salmonella enterica* infection after consuming coconut cream pie from Ramsey's Diner,  
8 located at 151 West Zandale Drive, Lexington, KY 40503, on June 19, 2025.

9 39. On June 20, 2025, Sharon developed acute gastrointestinal and systemic symptoms,  
10 including nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, stomach cramping, fevers up to 102°F, muscle aches, fatigue,  
11 headaches, and urinary tract symptoms.

12 40. Sharon sought medical attention on July 1, 2025, at the University of Kentucky Emergency  
13 Room, where she was initially diagnosed with a viral illness and urinary tract infection. She  
14 received IV fluids and potassium supplementation, improved temporarily, and was discharged with  
15 antibiotics and hydration instructions.

16 41. Stool testing from this visit returned positive for *Salmonella* via GI PCR panel, confirming  
17 infection despite negative bacterial cultures.

18 42. Sharon's symptoms worsened, and on July 3, 2025, she presented to Baptist Health  
19 Lexington ER with severe abdominal pain, weakness, and ongoing diarrhea. She was accompanied  
20 by her daughter, and both expressed concern that her illness was linked to a pie Sharon had eaten.  
21 Sharon explained that she had seen a health department report linking a recent *Salmonella* outbreak  
22 to "pies at a specific restaurant," from which she had consumed pie during the period of the  
23 outbreak the week prior.

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1 43. Sharon was treated with IV fluids and a targeted antibiotic, Levaquin, and discharged with  
2 diagnoses of “gastroenteritis, acute cystitis without hematuria, and dehydration.”

3 44. Sharon’s condition relapsed, and on July 18, 2025, she presented to New Lexington Clinic  
4 with urinary symptoms and malaise.

5 45. On July 22, 2025, Sharon returned to the clinic with recurrent, acute diarrhea and severe  
6 stomach cramps. Dr. Belcastro again evaluated her and noted that Sharon had been treated for  
7 *Salmonella* with levofloxacin for seven days. She ordered another stool sample to retest Sharon  
8 for “*C. difficile* vs. partially treated *Salmonella*.” She also requested a CT scan because of the level  
9 of pain Sharon reported. She extended the levofloxacin treatment as she thought it most likely  
10 Sharon still had *Salmonella* and now had colitis.

11 46. On July 29, 2025, Sharon’s stool studies collected on July 22 were reported as positive for  
12 both *Salmonella* and toxigenic *C. difficile*.

13 47. On August 1, 2025, Sharon began specialist care for *C. difficile* infection with continued  
14 monitoring and treatment through September 5, 2025.

15 48. Sharon’s illness caused profound personal disruption. She developed severe bowel  
16 incontinence requiring adult diapers, lost her independence, and became reliant on her daughter,  
17 Angela, who moved in to provide constant care during Sharon’s prolonged recovery. Sharon  
18 remained debilitated months after her initial infection.

19 49. A stool specimen collected on July 1, 2025, at the University of Kentucky Medical Center  
20 in Lexington, Kentucky tested positive for *Salmonella*. This and subsequent specimens were  
21 further tested at the Kentucky Department of Public Health (KY DPH) Laboratory, where they  
22 tested positive for *Salmonella* serotype Enteritidis (PulseNet IDs: KY\_\_2025-019571-223641309,  
23 KY\_\_2025-022001-223748079; WGS IDs: PNUSAS524125, PNUSAS530677, allele code:  
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1 SALM1.1-6.6.6.6x.8x.282212). Sharon was ultimately linked to the outbreak titled KY25-345 and  
 2 2507KYJEG-1 by the KY DPH. This outbreak was associated with pies from Ramsey’s  
 3 Diner/Missy’s Pies in Lexington, Kentucky.

4 **III. CAUSES OF ACTION**

5 **STRICT PRODUCT LIABILITY – COUNT I**

6 50. The Plaintiffs incorporate by reference and make a part of this Count each and every  
 7 foregoing paragraph of this Complaint.

8 51. At all times relevant to this action, the Defendant manufactured and sold adulterated food  
 9 products, egg-related desserts, which, as a result of their defective and unsafe condition due to  
 10 *Salmonella* Enteritidis contamination, caused injury to the Plaintiffs.

11 52. The adulterated food products that the Defendant manufactured and sold were, at the time  
 12 they left the Defendant’s control, defective and unreasonably dangerous for their ordinary and  
 13 expected use because of their contamination with *Salmonella*, a deadly pathogen.

14 53. The adulterated food products that the Defendant manufactured and sold were given to the  
 15 Plaintiffs without any change in their defective condition.

16 54. The adulterated food products that the Defendant manufactured and sold were used in the  
 17 manner expected and intended—that is, consumed by the Plaintiffs, Judy Walker, Linda Lear,  
 18 Kevin Lear, and Sharon King.

19 55. The Plaintiffs suffered injury and damages as a direct and proximate result of the defective  
 20 and unreasonably dangerous condition of the adulterated food products that the Defendant  
 21 manufactured and sold.

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**NEGLIGENCE AND NEGLIGENCE PER SE – COUNT II**

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2 56. The Plaintiffs incorporate by reference and make a part of this Count each and every  
3 foregoing paragraph of this Complaint.

4 57. The Defendant owed to the Plaintiffs a duty to use reasonable care in the manufacture and  
5 sale of its food products, the observance of which duty would have prevented or eliminated the  
6 risk that such food products would become contaminated with *Salmonella* or any other dangerous  
7 pathogen. The Defendant breached this duty and was negligent as a result.

8 58. The Defendant had a duty to comply with all safety statutes, laws, regulations, and codes  
9 including, but not limited to, the applicable provisions of the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic  
10 Act and similar Kentucky food and public health statutes, all of which prohibit the manufacture  
11 and sale of any food that is adulterated, or otherwise injurious to health. The Defendant failed to  
12 do so and was therefore negligent and negligent *per se*.

13 59. The Plaintiffs are among the class of persons intended to be protected by these statutes,  
14 laws, regulations, safety codes, and provision pertaining to the manufacture and sale of food  
15 products. Further, foodborne illness caused by the manufacture and sale of pathogen-contaminated  
16 food is the type of injury the safety statutes are intended to prevent.

17 60. The Defendant had a duty to properly train, supervise, and monitor its employees, and to  
18 ensure that these employees complied with all applicable safety statutes, laws, regulations, and  
19 safety codes pertaining to the manufacture and sale of food products at a retail food establishment,  
20 but the Defendant failed to do so and was therefore negligent and negligent *per se*.

21 61. The Defendant had a duty to use ingredients, supplies, and other materials that were  
22 reasonably safe, wholesome, free of defects, and that otherwise complied with applicable federal,  
23 state, and local laws, ordinances, and regulations, and that were clean, free from adulteration, and  
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1 safe for human consumption, but the Defendant failed to do so and was therefore negligent and/or  
2 grossly negligent.

3 62. The Defendant owed a duty of care to the Plaintiffs to design, prepare, serve, and sell food  
4 that was fit for human consumption, and that was safe to the extent contemplated by a reasonable  
5 consumer. The Defendant breached these duties and was negligent as a result.

6 63. As a direct and proximate result of the negligence of the Defendant, as alleged above, the  
7 Plaintiffs sustained injuries and damages in an amount to be determined at trial.

8 **BREACH OF WARRANTY – COUNT III**

9 64. The Plaintiffs incorporate by reference and make part of this Count each and every  
10 foregoing paragraph of this Complaint.

11 65. By offering food products for sale, the Defendant expressly warranted that such food was  
12 safe to eat, that it was not adulterated with a deadly pathogen, and that the food had been safely  
13 prepared under sanitary conditions.

14 66. By offering food products for sale, the Defendant also impliedly warranted that such food  
15 was safe to consume, that it was not adulterated with a deadly pathogen, and that the food had been  
16 safely prepared under sanitary conditions.

17 67. The Defendant breached express and implied warranties with regard to the contaminated  
18 food products it manufactured that were consumed by the Plaintiffs.

19 68. The Plaintiffs suffered personal injuries and damages as a foreseeable consequence of the  
20 breach of warranties by the Defendant, as set forth above, and are thus entitled to recover for all  
21 actual, consequential, and incidental damages that flow directly and in a foreseeable fashion from  
22 these breaches.

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**IV. DAMAGES**

69. The Plaintiffs have suffered general, special, incidental, and consequential damages as a direct and proximate result of the acts and omissions of the Defendants, which damages shall be fully proven at the time of trial, including, but not limited to: damages for loss of enjoyment of life, both past and future; medical and medical related expenses, both past and future; travel and travel-related expenses, past and future; emotional distress, and future emotional distress; pharmaceutical expenses, past and future; wage and other economic damages loss; and other ordinary, incidental, and consequential damages as would be anticipated to arise under the circumstances, .

**PRAYER FOR RELIEF**

WHEREFORE, the Plaintiffs pray, having stated their claim in full, for a judgment by this court against the Defendant as follows:

- 1. For general damages, in amounts to be proven at the time of trial;
- 2. For special damages, in amounts to be proven at the time of trial;
- 3. For punitive damages, in amounts to be proven at the time of trial;
- 4. For costs, including their reasonable attorney fees;
- 5. For trial by jury as to all matters so triable;
- 6. For such other and further relief as the court deems just and equitable in the circumstances.
